containing one hundred and twenty four acres and one third more or less
-core with all my right to the Saw Mill built by him and to sit & stand in considera-
-tion of the sum of Two Hundred and Thirty Dollars and out money and to be

-ling plantation too - to them their heirs and assigns forever. - I acknowledge this to be my

Item, I give unto my daughter Elizabeth Campbell the sum of five Shillings in money to her and her heirs forever.

Item, I give unto my daughter Sarah Black the sum of five Shillings to her and her heirs forever.

Item, I give unto my daughter Mary Black the sum of five Shillings to her and her heirs forever. Black wed by name Mary Perry Elizabeth Black gave to her and her heirs the sum of five Shillings in money to them and their heirs forever.

Item, I give unto my grand daughter Betty May the sum of five Shillings in money to her and her heirs forever.

Item, I give unto my grandson William Black one feather bed and furniture & young Bay Mare to him and his heirs forever.

Item, I give unto my grand daughter Sen Black daughter of Mitchell Black one negro woman named Sarah one negro child named John one mare cart to her and her heirs forever.

Item, I give unto my granddaughter Jane Black the sum of five Shillings in money to her and her heirs forever.

Item, I give unto my son David Black one negro man named Will two three year old horses one yearling horse two year old to him and his heirs forever. Provided he return home if he do to my two sons John & Benjamin Black to them their heirs and assigns to be equally divided. My desire is that the negro Man Will be hired out and the money kept for my son David by my Executors.

Item, My Will and desire is that my wearing apparel shall be equally divided between my grand daughters by the names of Ann Black.

Item, I give unto my son George Black one negro man named Isaac to him his heirs & assigns forever.

Item, I give unto my granddaughter Ann Matton Six Quensware plates to her and her heirs forever.

Also I give unto my son John Black and Benjamin Black their heirs and assigns their heirs & assigns to constitute make out and make the sole Executors of this my Last Will and Testament) all the remainder part of my estate by whom freely to be possessed and enjoyed. And I do hereby utterly disavow revoke and annul all and every other former Testaments Wills Legacies bequests and Executors by me in any wise before named, written and bequeathed, ratifying this and no other to be my Last Will and Testament. and desire is that the aforesaid Land and Plantation and appurtenances therunto belong-
ing all return and be rented during forever and the rent to be paid to my son William Wheeler
and five daughters, to wit; Sarah Wheeler, Miriam Wheeler, Rachel Wheeler Lydia Wheeler
and Selia Wheeler each receiving the rent of said Land, only, to my son William the first
years rent, and the next years rent to be divided equally amongst my five daughters before
named until five years are expired, then begin again at my son William Wheeler & so go on
as before mentioned but if either of them die that is my son William Wheeler or either of
my five daughters Sarah Wheeler, Miriam Wheeler, Rachel Wheeler Lydia Wheeler or
Selia Wheeler, then their part of said rent to be divided equal amongst the rest before
named.

Item, I give and bequeath to my well beloved son William Wheeler one Cow & Calf six
head of good sheep to him

Item, I give and bequeath to my dear and well beloved wife Miriam Wheeler the full
and entire enjoyment of the back room of my dwelling House during her widowhood and
my best bed and furniture and one piding horse, and one Cow and Calf and two Cows and
kids, and yearly to be paid by my son John Wheeler Ten bushels of Indian corn and
ten bushels of wheat during her widowhood, but if my son John should die before my
wife then the above mentioned corn and wheat, to be paid out of the rent of said Plantation
unto my well beloved Daughters to wit Mary Richardson, Susannah
